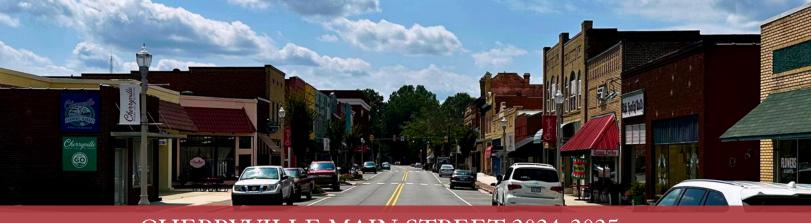
Georga Bea's

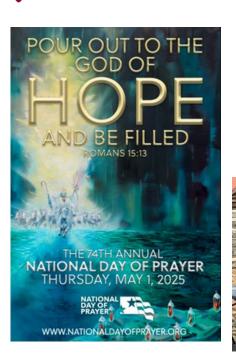


JUNETEENTH 2024

MAIN STREET PROGRAM ACCREDITED 12TH YEAR IN A ROW

The Cherryville Main Street program once again received National Accreditation. In order to receive this, volunteer hours, conferences, projects, events, and a host of requirements must be met. The program once again succeeded and surpassed the National requirements due to the awesome leadership of the CMSP teams and City of Cherryville City Council and City Manager.

"Where Life Blossoms"

In early 2024, the Cherryville Main Street design team initiated a comprehensive plan for the implementation of planters throughout the area. Led by team member Steve Panton, the proposal included urns designed to enhance the "Where Life Blossoms" theme within the central business district. Over several months, Steve diligently researched suitable planter types, selected appropriate plants, and developed an organized framework for this significant initiative. Following the team's approval of the design, it was presented to the City Manager and City Council, both of whom expressed strong support for the project.

In January 2025, the planters were ordered, and a planting day was scheduled for May. More than 20 volunteers from various committees and organizations participated in the planting efforts. We extend our gratitude to the Public Works Department for their assistance in positioning the urns in designated areas, and to UpChurch Nursery for their leadership, supplying the selected flowers, and providing guidance on planting and maintenance. A special acknowledgment is also due to Tommy Calhoun from our Main Street Public Works for his dedicated daily maintenance of the planters and the streetscape.

North Carolina Main Street Conference March 10-14,2025

Every year, the North Carolina Main Street (NCMS) hosts an annual state conference, which is mandatory for all Main Street Directors and participating cities. This year's conference took place in Mooresville, NC, marking it as the largest Main Street conference in the United States. With over 800 attendees, the event offered valuable training, marketing strategies, and opportunities to connect with vendors and suppliers relevant to the cities' Main Street programs.

Representing the City of Cherryville were David Day, the Main Street Director, and Donna Beringer, Chairperson of the Main Street Program. They participated in four days of classes and events aimed at bringing back innovative and fresh ideas for future planning.

Also in attendance were Mayor H.L. Beam, City Manager Brian Dalton, and City Council member Janis Hovis, who joined the awards banquet on Thursday, where our Public Works Department was honored with the NC Main Street Champions award. Public Works Director Chris King, Electrical Department Manager Ben Stroupe, and Main Street Public Works employee Tommy Calhoun accepted the award on behalf of the city.





































Business Destination Training

In August 2024, six merchants from Cherryville Main Street participated in a day of training led by National Marketing Trainer Jon Schallert in Morganton. This event was hosted by the Cherryville Main Street Program's Economic Development and Promotions Team. The training offered both digital and print strategies to help businesses promote their unique brands and merchandise, ultimately attracting shoppers to their stores. This conference was made possible through a grant from the North Carolina Main Street Program. Following the event, each merchant had the opportunity to continue their training online and earn certification as a "Business Destination."

NCMSP State Directors Meeting - Aug 2024

The city of Belmont hosted the NCMSP 2024 state directors meeting Aug 5 - 8th, 2024 92 directors and staff attended the training. This required training and meeting is held to bring the Main Street Directors up to-date on the State and National stringent requirements for accreditation.







Home Town Hero

In 2020, the Main Street Program (CMSP) initiated the Home Town Hero banners along Main Street and in the Central Business District. This initiative has proven to be one of our most successful promotional and design ventures to date. Each year, we have expanded the program, and as of Memorial Day 2025, we proudly displayed over 100 banners. We remain committed to enhancing this program by adding new banners each Veterans Day and Memorial Day.

Main Street Chairpersons



During my five years as Chairperson of the Economic Vitality Team (EV), the team has worked on attracting and supporting both new and existing businesses to establish Main Street as a destination for visitors and residents. Our strategic plan identifies suitable businesses for recruitment and offers training to current merchants. In the past fiscal year, a pub/bar/restaurant was opened, revitalizing a historic building and contributing to the development of a previously underutilized area of Main Street. Additional businesses have also joined Main Street and are participating in the future. The ongoing strategy aims to further develop Cherryville's Main Street into a community hub "Where Life Blossoms".

The ARB Board supports Cherryville's Main Street revitalization grants by guiding building owners through historic preservation guidelines and the grant process. The committee assists with maintaining architectural integrity and educates owners about National Historic Tax credits to support redevelopment. We review, approve, and monitor grant applications and completed projects. Over the past year, we approved \$62,626.25 in grants covering roofs, HVAC, electrical, and exterior improvements. These efforts, backed by City Council, have contributed to significant changes and growth in the Central Business District/Main Street, helping restore Cherryville as a vibrant community "Where Life Blossoms".

For over five years, I have contributed to the Cherryville Main Street program, currently serving as Chairperson of the Design Team. In this role, I introduced creative features like new plants and park updates while supporting the town's "Where Life Blossoms" motto.
